Resilience in the Face of Adversity

2025 has been a year so far where things that we expect to be permanent or happen automatically suddenly are not or do not. Throughout the spring, we have been hearing about the closing of the US Department of Education which has been around

for over 45 years. On July 1, we discovered that Congressionally authorized federal education funds meant to be disbursed to states and territories were impounded for review by the USDOE. All of a sudden, budgets and plans for the coming school vear were thrown into chaos.

The month of July was challenging

for adult education programs across California as they kicked off the 2025–26 school year, and for OTAN, this was no exception. Many of our colleagues are not aware that OTAN is 100% federally funded, and we immediately felt the impact of the impoundment and potential loss of funding.

Amid uncertainty, we have also seen the resilience of adult education shine through. Our CDE Adult Education Office, led by Dr. Carolyn Zachry, has been working overtime to provide support and guidance to the field. Since the AEO oversees OTAN, they have also helped us prioritize our work throughout the summer and into the fall. Even though we have not been able to begin many activities that we normally would at the start of a new school

year, we have been doing our best to provide the highest level of service to our constituents.

OTAN has continued to provide professional development sessions to schools as they prepare for a new school year. We have been working with agencies as they introduce or continue using Canvas with staff

and students. We have been rolling out new teaching and learning resources (described later in this Newsletter) for adult educators to use in classrooms with students.

It was five years ago when our education field went through a tumultuous moment that required pivoting quickly to a new reality. All of us at OTAN bring that same resolve to meet the challenge and operate as a leadership organization ready to support our colleagues.



Explore the Latest Adult Ed Courses in Canvas Commons

f your school uses Canvas, don't miss out on Canvas Commons, a library of shared Open Educational Resources (OERs) that educators can contribute to or use in their own courses. The Commons includes full courses, modules, templates, and activities. OTAN curates the California Adult Education Canvas Commons, a collection designed specifically for adult education, featuring ESL, CTE, and digital literacy courses, EL Civics modules, professional development resources, and adaptable templates.

What's New in Commons?

OTAN continues to expand its collection with new resources developed by professionals in the field:

- English for Multilingual Learners: A self-paced course for adult learners to practice English while building digital literacy, study skills, goal-setting, and financial literacy.
- OTAN Weekly Iconic Template: A fully customizable course template with engaging button styles designed for instructors who prefer weekly lesson layouts.
- DART: Digital Access and Resilience with Technology: A digital literacy and ESL curriculum helping learners master foundational computer and language skills needed to create and manage online accounts.
- **Digital ESL | Canvas Companion:** Curriculum integrating smartphone use and digital basics for beginner English learners, originally designed for older adults but adaptable for all ages.
- EDC Digital Upskilling Program | Computer Basics Toolkit: A hands-on Chromebook and Google Workspace course covering internet navigation, online safety, email, video calls, and more, with bilingual lesson materials.

Series sessions are also available. Where workshops and presentations can be scheduled individually, with a series, skills are gradually built around specific topics, apps, and/or digital tools over the course of several sessions.

Session Requirements

In-person (3 hour min.)

Virtual (1-1.5 hour min.)

- At least 2 weeks scheduling notice.
- A minimum of 8 registered participants 3 days before the event.
- All participants must be able to connect to a Zoom session.

Presentation Requirements

In-person (1 hour min.)

- 3 weeks notice before event.
- A projection system.

<u>Virtual (20 minutes min.)</u>

- 2 weeks notice before event.
- A projection system.

The Outreach and Technical Assistance Network (OTAN) provides electronic collaboration, information, and support for instructional technology and digital learning to adult education and literacy providers in California. Here is a list of some resources and the path to locate them on the OTAN website:

Teaching Tools and Resources

California Adult Education Digital Learning Guidance – The Guidance is designed to identify, document, and disseminate practical information for adult educators, classified and support staff, counselors and transition specialists, and administrators to support effective implementation of digital learning within adult education.

Accessibility Resources - You will find OTAN-developed resources as well as resources you can use to learn more about accessibility and create your own accessible content and presentations.

OTAN Canvas - OTAN Canvas is a partnership between Instructure, the Sacramento County Office of Education, and OTAN to provide access to the Canvas Learning Management System (LMS) for inperson, blended, and distance learning.

Teaching with Technology – A robust searchable database to help adult education teachers and staff locate web resources and other technology related to a specific lesson topic. You can filter your search by program areas, keywords, and standards.

Web-based Class Activities – Web-based activities are monthly technology-based activities organized around instructional themes and topics as well as edtech tools, with ideas on how to get started and how to use in the classroom.

Curriculum Offers – OTAN works to negotiate the best free or reduced-cost special offers for online curriculum licenses and professional development resources suggested by our OTAN Advisory Committee and adult educators in the field.

Lesson Plan Builder - Create, share, and publish lesson plans that follow the WIPPEA format and the Triple E Framework.

California EL Civics Exchange - The California EL Civics Exchange is a repository for original EL Civics instructional materials created by California WIOA, Title II: AEFLA/EL Civics agencies which can be used to teach EL Civics content to English language learners.

successful students throughout the years. Among the thirty-eight honorees, the top four scoring adult learners are then selected to be honored at public events during the year.

Techie's Tech Tip

Shh...Don't Tell the Robots!

rtificial intelligence is becoming a common learning tool, from schoolwork helpers to study aids. But sharing too much personal information can put your privacy at risk.



Avoid giving AI your full name, address, phone number, passwords, or any details that could identify you. Use examples that are generic,



not personal, when asking questions or uploading schoolwork. Be mindful that some Al systems may store or process what you share—so think before you type. Schools can help by teaching digital literacy, reviewing privacy policies together, and encouraging students

to ask, "Do I really need to share this?"

By treating personal information like a treasure worth protecting, students can enjoy the benefits of AI while keeping their identities and security safe.


