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Digital Learning Models that Meet the Challenge

Five years ago, the education field quickly pivoted from in-person to online instruction due to the outbreak of COVID-19. Although that was an extreme case, the fact is we may be asked to change direction at any moment for any number of reasons.

The start of 2025 brought horrendous fires that destroyed entire neighborhoods in the Los Angeles metro area. In the weeks after the inauguration of Donald Trump as president, there have been dramatic shifts in everyday governmental practices that have rippled across educational institutions affecting attendance and participation. There are also seasonal inclement weather events (like snowstorms and flooding) that affect the functioning of schools.


In moments like these, it is good to review what options students have to continue learning due to unforeseen circumstances. For example, if students' only option to attend classes is in person, how can they continue their studies if the school is suddenly closed, or they are fearful of attending due to increased immigration-related activity?

Chapter 5 of the Digital Learning Guidance for California Adult Education provides information on different learning modalities that an adult education agency can adopt so that students have options for attending and learning, not just when challenges arise. We start

with distance learning which includes online learning, what we are most familiar with from our time during the pandemic. There is also blended learning, similar to but different from hybrid learning, which is some mix of in-person and online learning. A newer model is hyflex learning, which allows learners to choose whether to attend classes face-

to-face or online, synchronously or asynchronously. By providing options, we give our learners more opportunities to participate and perhaps bring in students who might not be able to attend otherwise.

These options don't just spring up overnight. With thoughtful planning and intention, we can create a variety of modalities for students. Please reach out to OTAN to learn more about these models and how we can support bringing these models to your school. 🌐



Digital Learning Guidance is Getting an Update!

This spring marks an exciting new chapter in California's Digital Learning Guidance (DLG) for adult educators.

Building on the success of the 2022 edition, OTAN and our partner Community Learning Partners (CLP) have begun the first phase of the 2025 revision process: bringing together a diverse advisory group of educators, administrators, and experts across the state and nationally to ensure the Guidance remains relevant, accessible, and practical.


So far, the work has focused on gathering feedback from advisors, updating literature reviews, and launching a statewide Tech Trends Survey to understand the digital tools educators and learners are using, or should be. AI, Universal

Design for Learning, and career-focused learning emerged as hot topics, with an emphasis on real-world application and culturally responsive strategies.

With over 6,000 website visits, 14 statewide events, and 43 Canvas course enrollments since its initial release, the DLG continues to support adult education programs in transforming digital learning environments. This next version will offer even more instructional examples, tech integration strategies including the use of AI, and implementation tools in multiple formats, including an enhanced course and facilitator guides.

Over 300 attendees spanning a variety of roles joined us for two days of edtech-enriched training and collaboration with fellow educators. As usual, we didn't forget about those who couldn't join us in person; 34% of our attendees joined virtually from locales across California and other states.

Our keynote address started us off with momentum as Leticia Citizen, an educator of 23 years, spoke about current trends in education, including edtech implementation and the ongoing importance of DEI practices. Afterwards, our attendees experienced the

core of TDLS: the professional development sessions! Attendees had a choice of over 60 different sessions throughout the conference across a range of topics, including: AI and its myriad applications, best practices in hybrid teaching, hands-on training in edtech tools to implement in the classroom, and niche topics such as one agency's experience developing a CTE drone program.



Keeping with tradition, TDLS closed with our famous Tech Slam, an open-mic event where any attendee could get on the mic and show off a tech tool or tip they learned!

Maximize Productivity with Virtual Desktops

Virtual desktops can help you organize your workspace and boost productivity. Virtual desktops allow you to separate tasks, reduce clutter, and maintain focus. Whether you're managing multiple projects or balancing work and personal tasks, virtual desktops can streamline your workflow.



- On Windows, use Windows + Ctrl + D to create a new virtual desktop. Switch between desktops with Windows + Ctrl + Left/Right Arrow and close a desktop with Windows + Ctrl + F4.
- On Mac, access Mission Control with F3 or Control + Up Arrow to manage your desktops. Create a new desktop by clicking the + button in the top-right corner. Switch between desktops with Control + Left/Right Arrow.
